This accreditation is recognized by Indigenous people from around the world, and is seen as a very powerful unification of Indigenous Educators.

We extend warm congratulations to our students and thanks to all who made this possible; including staff, instructors, Board members, Indigenous Knowledge Guardians, students and language program graduates.

Champions for Change

The 4th annual Champions for Change conference was held in November, 2016. This year's theme was Celebrating Resilience - Moving Forward. The Conference is SNP's signature fundraising campaign, supporting the vision of achieving international distinction for excellence in Indigenous education, Indigenous language revitalization, and continuance of Indigenous knowledge. The campaign also supports tuition sponsorship for students attending SNP as nearly 400 Six Nations citizens, annually, experience financial barriers precluding an opportunity to pursue post-secondary education.

First Class graduates from the Bachelor of Arts in Ogwehoweh Languages Program

This year marked an historic milestone for SNP as we celebrated the first ever graduating class of the Bachelor of Arts in Ogwehoweh Language Degree program. The historic ceremony symbolizes the strength and perseverance of Indigenous people and defines the true meaning of language revitalization. Hodinohso:ni Ambassador Program

This year, 20 participants completed the program and were also provided an opportunity to attend and present at the World Indigenous Peoples Conference on Education (WIPCE). World Indigenous Peoples Conference on Education

Strategy for Institutional Accreditation


SNP continues to work with the province to obtain formal recognition which will include SNP receiving University status. SNP is pleased to see that the province has committed twice the funding to Aboriginal Institutes for the 2017/18 year and SNP will continue to advocate for stable funding. This work has involved ongoing meetings and presentations with the standing committee to the senate and we expect to see the results of this work come to fruition in 2018.

SNP STEAM Academy opens its doors to its first grade 9 students

In September 2017, Six Nations Polytechnic opened the first STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics) focused school in Canada that will build in both the regular Ontario Secondary School Diploma, as well as a two-year "Computer Software Engineering Technician" college diploma. Although it is a private school, there is no tuition; as with all SNP programs, the STEAM Academy is open to everyone regardless of their cultural or social background.

SNP Programming responds to community need. The scope and impact of this programming is extended significantly as a result of SNP's many partnerships.




SIX NATIONS ACHIEVEMENT CENTRE






1. WORLD INDIGENOUS PEOPLES CONFERENCE ON EDUCATION, 2017

The World Indigenous Peoples Conference on Education (WIPCE) hosted by Six Nations Polytechnic, in partnership with TAP Resources, culminated on Friday, July 28 with much success. WIPCE attracted approximately 3000 Indigenous scholars and experts from around the world. The theme of WIPCE 2017 was "A Celebration of Resilience;" a theme well chosen as many delegates expressed their resilience through presentations, performance, and sharing of their Indigenous knowledge systems.

During the conference, approximately 700 presentations in various formats were delivered. The different presentation styles included Full Length Workshops and Presentations, Ignite Sessions, and Panel Discussions.

In addition to the traditional presentations, Master Classes were included in the conference program. The Master Classes included in-depth discussion and group work within a specific topic area. Four topic areas were offered in the programming lasting over the course of two days. On the third day, the delegates enrolled in the Master Classes attended the tradi-

tional WIPCE workshops and presentations. The Master Classes were a new addition to WIPCE and a trial run for Master Class Coordinator, Professor Bob Morgan.

Also new to this year's WIPCE was the implementation of Ignite Sessions. Ignite Sessions consisted of 3 distinct presentations within a 45 minute time slot. The presenters of each presentation were asked to share the 45 minute time frame amongst themselves. Overall, the Ignite Sessions were well received by the audience. Words that could be heard about the Ignite Sessions were "powerful," "intense," "moving" and "uplifting."

Hosting the largest Indigenous education conference is a major accomplishment that the whole of Six Nations Polytechnic can be proud of. Hosting this conference was a team effort which showed the strength and resiliency of the SNP community. All of the staff pulled together to not only do what needed to be done, but to enjoy their time at WIPCE and make it enjoyable for others around them. This is the true meaning and demonstration of strength and resilience.

- Hosted visitors from Peru and Chile, South America, seeking ways to recover and preserve their Mapuche language
- Consulted and assisted with the Great Law Reading at Six Nations
- Developed partnership with Archives of Ontario



- Consulted and assisted with development of the Longhouse project at Kayanase
- Provided guidance and input at the Hamilton Indigenous Roundtable
- Delivered presentation at Treaty Week series for GEDSB high schools
- Entered partnership with Laurier University to develop and host a website on Free, Prior and Informed Consent

5. WORLD INDIGENOUS NATIONS HIGHER EDUCATION CONSORTIUM ACCREDITATION AND AGM 2017

One of the highlights of WIPCE 2017 for Six Nations Polytechnic was receiving WINHEC accreditation for a period of ten years. The WINHEC Accreditation means that an Indigenous-serving institution/school/ program's work:

• Is framed by the Indigenous philosophy of the Indigenous community it serves,

- Is soundly conceived and intelligently devised,
- Integrates Indigenous culture, language, and worldviews into programming,
- Is purposefully being accomplished in a manner that should continue to merit confidence by the Indigenous constituencies being served.

When granted, accreditation applies to the entire institution/school/program in operation at the time of the most recent full-scale review. In this case, it indicates that the institution has been carefully and thoroughly examined and has been found to be achieving its own particular purposes in a satisfactory manner.

Furthermore, accreditation by the WINHEC Accreditation Authority takes into account and supports the diversity which exists among Indigenous-serving educational institutions, schools and programs. Quality is evaluated in terms of the purposes the institution seeks to accomplish. Once deemed to have met the criteria established by the WINHEC Accreditation Authority, candidate institutions and programs become full voting members of the WINHEC Accreditation Authority Board with all the rights and privileges specified in the enclosed Guiding Principles.

In the midst of WIPCE preparation, SNP graciously hosted 54 international delegates for the World Indigenous Nations Higher Education Consortium - WINHEC Annual General Meeting. The meeting was held July 21st & 22nd at the Brantford campus for day one followed by the Ohsweken campus for day two. We received excellent feedback regarding our hospitality and look forward to being a part of the WINHEC family. The WINHEC Board concluded their visit with the Board of Accreditation presentation on Thursday, July 27th in Toronto during WIPCE.



BUILDING UNDERSTANDING ACROSS CULTURES



1. BRANTFORD CAMPUS AND THE STRATEGIC INVESTMENTS FUND RENOVATION

SNP's new Brantford Campus provides more opportunities to build bridges between cultures, allowing students from the non-Indigenous community, as well as Indigenous students living in Brantford, to access the programs that we offer. Cross-cultural awareness is our goal.

Six Nations Polytechnic (SNP) Modernizes Brantford Campus

With strong support from Sheldon Levy, Deputy Minister of Advanced Education and Skills Development and his team, and a \$5 M grant from the Government of Canada's Post-Secondary Institutions Strategic Investment Fund, SNP has transformed the Brantford campus! The professional expertise of K.L. Martin & Associates Corp. made this one-year transition possible.

Energy Efficiencies and Cost Savings

SNP worked with Brant Renewable Energy, a leader in energy generation and conservation projects, to design and install LED energy efficient lights and a ballasted 400 Kilowatt solar roof.

Technology and Infrastructure

With the expertise of I/O Vision, who recommended a highly scalable technology solution using Nutanix and Lenovo products, SNP has created an infrastructure at the Brantford campus that can readily handle our planned growth.

New Multi-Purpose Spaces

Approximately 777 m² of small spaces were updated, and repurposed. The new, larger, multi-function rooms give SNP additional flexibility to deliver new programs and to carry out research (scientific and academic) and innovative projects. Our thanks go out to Lanca Contracting Limited, who completed the renovations.

2. BUNDLED ARROWS INITIATIVE

The Bundled Arrows is in its fourth year and has brought together a collective of post-secondary institutions and organizations to design a Regional Indigenous Education Plan. The plan will enhance Six Nations Polytechnic's position as the hub of Indigenous Knowledge for this region and will bring the BAI partners together to create collaborative programs and services that will improve pathways and opportunities for Indigenous learners.

3. CONTRIBUTIONS TO ELEMENTARY EDUCATION

In addition to providing workshops, in-service and resources to teachers, SNP is an accredited AQ provider with the Ontario College of Teachers. The 2016-2017 AQ offerings included:

5. LOCAL POVERTY REDUCTION STRATEGY

The Local Poverty Reduction Strategy, funded through a multi-year agreement with the province, is developed through our Brantford Campus to work with a number of community agencies to empower learners to avoid poverty through education and training opportunities in our region. Through wrap around services in our Community Service Hub and specialized curriculum, we are creating an environment that will reduce the collective tolerance of poverty in the general public and enhance student support and success.

HOMEWORK SUPPORT PROGRAM

Homework Support offers Six Nations youth in grades 5-12, homework assistance in all subject areas in a relaxed, supportive learning environment. Post-secondary students are welcome as well. Students have access to the internet/computers to complete assignments and projects. Students are required to bring their homework, books and any materials that will assist the tutors in supporting their needs. The location is a quiet place for all to work and study. We offer tutor support especially for Math and Science (Chemistry, Biology, Calculus and Physics) courses in secondary school so that these students have a dedicated tutor who works with the curriculum expectations. Our mandate is to support students in all areas of their academic achievements through continued homework support during the evenings as required. Our tutors work at the various elementary and secondary schools with our students and have an expertise in their area of support. Homework Support is offered Monday through Thursday evenings at Polytechnic from 6 pm to 9 pm.





Six Nations Polytechnic is a *Centre of Excellence* for Hodinohso:nih language, history and cultural materials and continues to expand its capacity to serve as an interdisciplinary resource hub with partners.

SNP will apply for Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) administrator status to enable the Institute to support this activity more directly.

Research is currently underway to explore how SNP can provide online and distance learning for our courses.
