Living in Six Nations

S ix Nations Polytechnic is located in the heart of Southern Ontario, situated on the picturesque Grand River. Approximately an hour and a half drive along from Toronto and the Niagara region, Six Nations is the most populous First Nation in Canada, with over 12,000 residents and over 26,000 members.

ENTERTAINMENT AND CULTURE

Art and music are alive and well in Six Nations and can be found at the Woodland Cultural Centre (WCC). With annual programs like First Nations Art, which features artists from across Canada and the United States, and the Coffee House and Open Mic Night, the Woodland Cultural Centre is bustling with distinctly creative programs.

Chiefswood National Historic

Site: Originally home to the famous poet, E. Pauline Johnson, the homestead provides visitors with a unique opportunity to experience life in Six Nations during the mid-1800s as a place where different cultures met.

Shopping: Shopping local has never been easier in Six Nations. Iroqrafts is the place to purchase craft supplies, moccasins, books, Indigenous artwork and more. There's a grocery store just around the corner from Six Nations Polytechnic and in the village centre stands the Iroquois Plaza with restaurants, banks, and retail stores.



RECREATION

Food and Fun: Whether you're looking to bite into a world-famous hamburger, hang out with friends at the local pizza joint, or curl up with a coffee at a cosy home-style café, Six Nations has it all. A wide variety of local options gives residents and students all the choices they need.

Sports: Six Nations is the self-proclaimed lacrosse capital of the world. In fact, thousands of years ago the Hodinohso:ni invented the game that turned into modern lacrosse. Lacrosse is sometimes referred to as The Creator's Game and is of important cultural significance in the community. Today, lacrosse games can be seen year-round in Six Nations.

Also, because it is centred on the Grand River, the Six Nations community is able to enjoy recreational water activities such as canoeing, fishing, paddle boarding, water skiing and more. The river also serves as a beautiful scenic backdrop and attracts hundreds of visitors every year. Parks and Trails: The Six Nations community is home to largest single block of Carolinian forest in Canada, visible even from satellite images taken from outer space. With two beautiful parks and walking trails, there's no better place to witness the leaves change to yellow and red in the fall, watch the snow fall gracefully in winter – or better yet – have a picnic in the shade under a magnificent maple tree in the summer. Veteran's Park and Chiefswood Park are a constant source of activity, with different events happening year round.

HOUSING

Practical Nursing with Aboriginal Communities

CREDENTIAL:

Ontario College Diploma

PROGRAM LENGTH: 2 Years

LOCATION:

Brantford Campus

PROGRAM SUMMARY:

Practical Nursing is an Ontario College Diploma program offered at Six Nations Polytechnic Brantford Campus and Mohawk's Institute for Applied Health Sciences which is located at McMaster University. The Practical Nursing program runs continuously for 16 calendar months over four semesters and is offered every other year.

Experience collaborative learning - the methodology used where you are responsible for your own learning and for contributing to the learning of your peers. Faculty members provide structure and act as facilitators through consultation, assisting with group collaborative activities and providing feedback.

Clinical placements are an integral part of this program and may occur at locations that are not accessible by public transit. As such, students shall be expected to either have access to a car or the ability to supply their own transportation when attending clinical placement activity.

EDUCATION PATHWAYS:

After successful completion of the Practical Nursing diploma program, graduates are eligible to write the Canadian Registered Practical Nurse Examination (CRPNE) which is administered by the College of Nurses of Ontario (CNO).

Nursing careers may involve working at Hospitals, Physicians' Offices, Retirement Homes, Community Agencies, Nursing Homes, Long Term Care Homes and Business and Industry.



Frequently-Asked Questions

How will I know Six Nations Polytechnic has received my application?

Six Nations Polytechnic will send an Acknowledgement Letter via regular mail to you after your application has been received. The Acknowledgement Letter may include specific program information that you will need regarding special admission requirements and/or pre-admission testing.

Are accommodations provided for students with disabilities?

Students with documented disabilities requiring academic accommodations must contact the Student Success Officer (SSO) to find out what SNP can offer, however there are very limited funds to provide such. Contact the SSO for more details at 519-445-0023, ext. 234.

Do I need to provide my transcript(s)?

Yes. To ensure a speedy application process, you must ensure all required documents have been received by the Admissions Office within four weeks of submitting your application, or no later than August 14, 2018, for postsecondary programs. Six Nations Polytechnic requires that official transcripts are submitted. Photocopied, faxed or electronically transmitted copies are only accepted if coming directly from the issuing institute.

Can I apply as a Mature Student?

Mature Students are considered on an individual basis but must still meet the required pre-requisite courses. Testing may be required.

College programs: A Mature Student is someone who is age 19 or older without an Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) or equivalent, as of the first day of classes. Mature Student applicants must meet all specific entrance requirements of the program to which they are applying. If you possess an OSSD, regardless of your age or number of years out of high school, Mature Student status does not apply.

University programs: A Mature Student has not attended secondary school or college on a full-time basis for at least two years; and has not previously attended university [subject to change].

When will I know if I have been admitted?

Applications with all supporting documents are screened and a letter of acceptance or denial is mailed to you after screening. You will have four weeks to accept our offer of admission. If the offer of admission has not been accepted by the deadline, this will be considered a rejection of the offer of admission.

Offers of acceptance are conditional for applicants who may be in the process of completing admission requirements. An offer of acceptance will be revoked if proof of successful completion of the required courses or any other admission requirements are not met.

How do I accept my offer of admission?

If you wish to accept the offer of admission, please sign and date your letter of acceptance and return the original to Six Nations Polytechnic. Please note that you will need a copy of your signed letter when applying for funding at such agencies as Grand River Post-Secondary Education Office, New Credit First Nations Education, Southern First Nation Secretariat or for bursaries and scholarships.

What if I have been denied admission?

Candidates may be denied admission when the program and/or waiting list is filled, or when all of the admission requirements have not been met. Applicants may request an admission review. A written request must be received within 15 days of the admission decision. You may contact Program Manager/Registrar, at 519-445-0023, ext.221, or e-mail programmanager@ snpolytechnic.com.

What if my program has a health requirement?

Some programs require students to meet certain medical and health criteria, such as a completed Communicable Disease Screening Form. Information will be available at the time of registration. Students must submit completed forms by the deadline indicated and meet all medical criteria. These are necessary for clinical/field placements. Failure to meet criteria could result in expulsion from the program.

How do I find out about credit transfer (exemption) opportunities?

Colleges in Ontario and Canada generally offer year-for-year credit transfers from similar programs. To learn if you are eligible for exemptions or are able to transfer credits for any of our programs, please contact Six Nations Polytechnic at 519-445-0023. Please note: courses taken more than five years ago generally are not given credit for exemption.

What is Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR)?

Six Nations Polytechnic believes that many people acquire college-level learning and skills through various situations such as prior work experience, community work, non-credit courses, self-directed study, travel and military service. Candidates who can show that they have achieved the learning outcomes of a specific course may be granted credits based on an assessment of their prior learning.
