


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Welcome to SNP

Six Nations Polytechnic is located in the heart of Southern Ontario, situated on the picturesque Grand River.

RECREATION

Food and Fun: Whether you're looking to bite into a world-famous hamburger, hang out with friends at the local pizza joint, or curl up with a coffee at a cosy home-style café, Six Nations has it all. A wide variety of local options gives residents and students all the choices they need.

Sports: Six Nations is the self-proclaimed lacrosse capital of the world. In fact, thousands of years ago the Hodinohso:ni invented the game that turned into modern lacrosse.

Lacrosse is sometimes referred to as The Creator's Game and is of important cultural significance in the community. Today, lacrosse games can be seen year-round in Six Nations.

Also, because it is centred on the Grand River, the Six Nations community is able to enjoy recreational water activities such as canoeing, fishing, paddle boarding, water skiing and more. The river also serves as a beautiful scenic backdrop and attracts hundreds of visitors every year.

Parks and Trails: The Six Nations community is home to the largest single block of Carolinian forest in

Canada, visible even from satellite images taken from outer space. With two beautiful parks and walking trails, there's no better place to witness the leaves change to yellow and red in the fall, watch the snow fall gracefully in winter – or better yet – have a picnic in the shade under a magnificent maple tree in the summer. Veteran's Park and Chiefswood Park are a constant source of activity, with different events happening year-round.

MASTER OF PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

(PROGRAM PARTNER: WESTERN UNIVERSITY)

Credential: Master's Degree

Program Length: Two Years

Campus: Six Nations

Program Summary: The Master of Professional Education Program in the field of Aboriginal Educational Leadership is a course-based graduate program leading to an MPEd degree. Students proceed through the program together as a cohort and complete seven designated courses and a capstone project over six terms (two years). Student choice is encouraged through a process that allows individual and groups to tailor course assignments, case studies and projects to meet their learning and professional goals.

Description: In addition to offering the core components of the educational leadership stream, the Leadership in Aboriginal Education route considers Indigenous ways of leading, knowing, teaching and learning. A specific emphasis on organizational and pedagogical strategies to improve Aboriginal student success is included as part of a broader consideration of the social, political and economic context of education.

Graduates of the program will have an understanding of the historical and contemporary conditions of Aboriginal education in Canada, a comprehensive knowledge of current scholarship on Indigenous knowledge and research methodologies, and a thorough grounding in theories and practices of leadership.

This master's program prepares educators for a range of leadership roles in provincially funded or First Nations schools and school systems, colleges and other adult learning settings, and related agencies and organizations.

Admission Requirements:

- A four-year degree (20 full courses or equivalent) from an accredited university.
- Minimum "B" standing (70%) or equivalent in the final two years of study.



Recommended:

· Minimum one-year full-time teaching experience, or experience within the field of education.

Notes & Exceptions:

- · Bachelor of Education and Additional Qualification course grades are not used in calculating admission averages.
- · Applicants with 3-year degrees will be considered on a case-by-case basis if seats are available in programs. Successful experience as an educator in a professional setting may be considered in the selection process.
- Probationary Status: If an applicant does not meet all of the minimum admission requirements (e.g. average below 70% and/or has only a 3-year degree plus B.Ed.) the applicant may be offered admission as a Probationary Student with Conditions.
- Conditions: Applicants will be required to maintain a 75% average in each of these courses to clear conditions.
- · The successful completion of an MPEd degree does not lead to certification with the Ontario College of Teachers (OCT).

Program Summary: This program builds on the knowledge and skills acquired in the diploma Practical Nursing program. Students receive 30 units of advanced credit and enter at Level II. The 2 Level II 'nursing' courses are designed to assist students in transitioning to the baccalaureate program. Both streams are integrated for most courses. The curriculum is planned for 3 years of full-time study. Students are allowed six years after the first 'nursing' course to complete the program requirements.
